The Samuel S. Stratton VAMC is a 150 bed tertiary care facility located in the heart of New York's capitol. Along with 10 community based outpatient clinics, this institution works to provide comprehensive healthcare to more than 25,000 Veterans each year. The VA medical center provides a full range of outpatient and inpatient services, including services for those residing in our community living center (CLC). The Stratton VAMC is dedicated to teaching and educating future healthcare professionals, and maintains affiliations with Albany College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences (ACPHS); Western New England College of Pharmacy; Binghamton University; and Albany Medical College. This allows for a variety of didactic teaching and precepting opportunities that can be tailored to the resident's clinical interests. The ASHP Accreditation Standard for Postgraduate Year One (PGY1) Pharmacy Residency Programs establishes criteria for residency programs building upon Doctor of Pharmacy (Pharm.D.) education and outcomes to contribute to the development of clinical pharmacists responsible for medication-related care of patients with a wide range of conditions, eligible for board certification, and eligible for Postgraduate Year Two (PGY2) pharmacy residency training.

# Antimicrobial Stewardship (Inpatient); Transitions of Care [REQUIRED]

This rotation will primarily focus on inpatient antimicrobial stewardship while providing opportunities for the learner to explore acute and critical care. The goal of the rotation is for the learner to develop an understanding of appropriate antimicrobial therapy based on pertinent laboratory and microbiologic data. Additional activities will include outpatient stewardship as opportunities present and transitioning care of patients from inpatient to outpatient and across acuity levels.

## Behavioral Health [REQUIRED]

This rotation exposes the resident to various mental health conditions (PTSD, Depression, Anxiety, Bipolar Disorder, Schizophrenia, Substance Use Disorders, etc.) and allows the resident to develop skills in the assessment and management of these conditions. Residents will participate in the following: patient interviews, substance abuse and medication education group, mental status exams, assessments (Suicide Risk Assessment, AIMS, etc.), therapeutic drug monitoring of psychotropic medications (lithium, valproic acid, etc.), and side effect management.

## Clinical Pharmacy Administration/Academic Detailing/Pharmacogenomics [REQUIRED]

This rotation is a longitudinal rotation meant to expose the resident to different components of clinical pharmacy administration, academic detailing (AD), and pharmacogenomics (PGx). The resident will become familiar with local, regional and national formulary management processes of the VA healthcare system. The resident will assist the preceptor in analyzing and writing up cost saving proposals and medication use evaluations. The resident will also work with the local Academic Detailer to learn about patient safety campaigns of the National Academic Detailing program and the technique of detailing providers about these initiatives. The resident will work with the PGx pharmacist to gain a deeper understanding of the VA's novel PGx initiative and perform clinical/outreach visits accordingly.

# **Outpatient Pharmacy [REQUIRED]**

This rotation provides the resident opportunities to become proficient in analyzing and processing electronic prescription orders while having the ability to access computerized patient information including progress notes and labs. The resident will communicate with prescribers to rectify drug-related problems. Additionally, the resident will gain experience in outpatient dispensing, checking prescriptions, and counseling patients in the outpatient pharmacy.

# Pain Management [REQUIRED]

This rotation is focused on chronic, non-cancer pain management with some opportunity for acute pain intervention. Conditions such as anxiety disorder, PTSD, and depression offer daily occasions to spotlight drug-drug interactions and psychopharmacology. Serum monitoring and UDS interpretation are important PK parameters requiring daily input. The resident will be part of an IDT that includes specialty providers and will serve as a mentor for P4 pharmacy students.

# Primary Care [REQUIRED/ELECTIVE]

#### Red Team, Blue Team, Rural Health, Silver Team

The resident will take part in management of diabetes, HTN, asthma/COPD, tobacco use disorder, HLD, and others as they relate to the ambulatory care setting. Silver team serves patients 75 and older. Rural health is completed at off-campus clinics. The resident will interact with providers to resolve drug-related problems, answer drug information questions, and recommend formulary alternatives.

# Medication Surveillance [LONGITUDINAL]

This elective rotation will provide the resident with an opportunity to participate in a learning experience with exposure to medication and patient safety. The pharmacist is an integral member of the healthcare team who works closely with the patient safety office to investigate near miss and patient errors that took place in the pharmacy department and works closely with the patient safety manager. In addition, this rotation is designed to have the resident evaluate reported adverse drug reactions on a monthly basis.

## Community Living Center (CLC) [LONGITUDINAL]

The Stratton VA Community Living Center (CLC) provides long-term skilled nursing care, as well as short-term restorative and rehabilitative care to the veteran population. The resident will be responsible for conducting comprehensive medication reviews for CLC patients and communicating any patient care needs to a multi-disciplinary team.

#### Anticoagulation Clinic [ELECTIVE]

This rotation allows residents to develop skills as independent practitioners in a pharmacist-run outpatient Anticoagulation Clinic <u>+</u> an emphasis in CHF clinic. Residents will actively participate in various aspects of anticoagulation management, including but not limited to, therapeutic drug monitoring of warfarin, DOACs, and periprocedural anticoagulation management.

# Nephrology & Dialysis [ELECTIVE]

The pharmacy resident will participate in identifying and resolving medication therapy issues for the nephrology/dialysis population. The pharmacy resident will also participate in reviews of patient profiles for appropriateness of drug dosing and will gain confidence in adjusting medication regimens in the renal population, specifically in anemia management.

#### Rheumatology [ELECTIVE]

The clinic is staffed by physicians and other clinicians (medical residents, fellows, and students) who specialize in rheumatology. The resident will interact with Rheumatologists, Fellows, Residents and Nurses. The resident will be responsible for designing, implementing, assessing, monitoring, and documenting therapeutic plans utilizing the most effective, least toxic and most economical medication treatments in order to achieve positive patient centric outcomes through direct and indirect interactions with patients, providers, and interdisciplinary teams.
