Purpose Statement & Program Description

The purpose of this program is to build upon Doctor of Pharmacy (PharmD) education and outcomes to contribute to develop pharmacist practitioners with knowledge, skills, and abilities as defined in the educational competency areas, goals, and objectives. Residents who successfully complete PGY1 residency programs will be skilled in diverse patient care, practice management, leadership, and education, and be prepared to provide patient care, seek board certification in pharmacotherapy (i.e., BCPS) and pursue advanced education and training opportunities including postgraduate year 2 (PGY2) residencies.

This program will provide two residents with 52 weeks of clinical patient care experience, serving a challenging and gratifying Veteran population. Residents will work with a variety of clinical pharmacists with prescriptive authority and advance to independently practice in various ambulatory care settings such as: primary care, rural health, anticoagulation, mental health, diabetes, and pain. Graduates of the program will be prepared to excel in patient safety, formulary management, pharmacy operations, and leadership.

Position Information

- Estimated Stipend: \$47,995
- Benefits: 13 days accrued sick leave, 13 accrued vacation days, medical, dental, life, and vision insurance options available, 11 paid federal holidays, free on-site parking, authorized leave for residency related activities (financial support may be available)
- Estimated program dates: July 1- June 30
- No required staffing on nights or weekends
- Pharmacy residents are provided resources including a laptop computer, private office space (shared with co-resident), and access to tele-work as needed
- Residents are expected to possess full, current, and unrestricted licensure to practice pharmacy in a State, Territory, or Commonwealth of the United States, or the District of Columbia within 120 days beginning the program.
